13. Robin Lail, founder of Lail Vineyards

What are the differences between being a woman in the alcohol industry vs. being a man?

I have great admiration for both Merry Edwards and Zelma Long who pioneered the role of female winemakers in such stunning and successful ways. They emerged in the 1970s and represented a breakaway from women's roles solely as bookkeepers, secretaries, tour guides and publicists. Today women can be found in roles throughout management and production in the wine industry in California. It will come as no surprise that there are still more men than women in the wine business, but perhaps a woman's advantage arises from her distinctive, fresh approach to leadership, creativity, production and problem solving.

Favorite food/drink pairing?

Lail Vineyards Georgia Sauvignon Blanc and Kumamoto oysters from Tomales Bay.

Favorite unexpected food/drink pairing?

Pinot Noir and truffle popcorn or champagne and potato chips with sour cream and caviar.

Favorite bottle of wine?

1933 Inglenook Cabernet Sauvignon.

Go-to cocktail?

Tequila Reposado on the rocks with three limes and salt on the rim of the glass
